This committee of some twenty-five men and women operate as Heckington & District Agricultural Society (a registered charity) with each member taking on a specific part of the show.

It all takes place on ancient

grounds, shaded by fine trees - all in the shadow of the magnificent tower of the village church of St Andrew. The result is the atmosphere of the quintessentially English village show offering the facilities, events and entertainment we all expect in the twenty-first century. And there really is something for everyone – it’s the place to take your children and your parents!

The 2009 main ring programme promises to be truly breathtaking. The show is delighted to welcome the JCB Balls Digger Dance display

team putting their machines to extremes that would even amaze Bob the Builder. No less extreme are the World famous Vander Brothers performing daring acts high above the showground on their giant spinning wheels. No show would be complete without an ‘invasion’ from the Heritage Village – there have been Romans and Vikings in past years and this year the show welcomes Anglo-Saxon warriors who will give a suitably blood-curdling demonstration.
